NJCAA Mourns the Passing of JOE ROCKENBACH

VETERAN ROCHESTER STATE JUNIOR COLLEGE ATHLETIC DIRECTOR WAS NJCAA OFFICIAL
FOR FOURTEEN YEARS

Joseph Rockenbach, Treasurer of the National Junior College Athletic Association, Athletic Director and Head Basketball Coach at Rochester State Junior College, Rochester, Minnesota, died after a long illness on February 21—two days after his 58th birthday. The veteran junior college coach and administrator, who was one of Rochester's most active and popular citizens, underwent surgery last September and had been in failing health since that time. In respect to Mr. Rockenbach, college classes were cancelled at Rochester State on February 24th.

A native of Lake County, Illinois, Rockenbach became athletic director and basketball coach at the then Rochester Junior College in 1946, and led his basketball teams to five conference titles and a Region XIII championship. His career coaching record showed 223 victories and 170 defeats in 19 seasons to rank ninth among all junior college basketball coaches. He also coached football from 1946 through 1951, when the sport was dropped from the College's athletic program. In addition to these responsibilities, he had, over the years, coached the track, tennis, and golf teams. His track squads won three conference championships; his tennis team captured eight conference titles; and his golf teams won eleven conference crowns, ten of them in succession.

Mr. Rockenbach served as President of the Rochester Municipal Recreation Board from its inception in 1958 until it was merged with the City Park and Recreation Department. He was



also a Past President of the Olmsted County Chapter of the Infantile Paralysis Foundation, and Chairman of the Olmsted County March of Dimes. Selected as one of Minnesota's 1958 Centennial Year sports champions, he was Past President of the Southern Minnesota Athletic Conference, and a member of the first Minnesota Governor's Physical Fitness Committee. His name was listed in the 1968 edition of "Community Leaders of America."

Mr. Rockenbach was a graduate of Northern Illinois State College and received his Master's degree from Northwestern University. He did additional graduate study at the University of Minnesota and New York University. While in college he was an all

conference football selection and won the conference heavyweight wrestling title.

In 1955, Mr. Rockenbach was elected Director of Region XIII of the National Junior College Athletic Association and served with distinction in that capacity until 1962 when he was elected Treasurer of the NJCAA. For the last several years he served as chairman of the NJCAA Wrestling Committee, was a member of the Wrestling Committee for the 1968 Olympic Games, and was 1st Vice-President of the recently formed United States Wrestling Federation.

Joe Rockenbach was devoted to serving the needs of young men and women. His wisdom and hard work provided inspiration for those who had the privilege of knowing him and working with him.

PAST TOURNAMENTS

1968—Glendale Community College battled the odds to win the national crown. The Gauchos dropped their tournament opener 15-8 at the hands of Manatee College but rebounded to win five straight games and the crown. Glendale's Otis McCowan was selected as the tournament's Most Valuable Player.

1967—The Bacone Warriors lashed out 16 hits to defeat Odessa 10-4 for the national title. Gerald Pirtle of Bacone was the recipient of the most valuable player award, Ed Bravo of Miami-Dade was to top hitter with a .500 average and Larry Koch of Nassau was voted the most likely to succeed.

1966—Nassau Community College of Garden City, N. Y. won its first national title with a come-from-behind victory over Miami-Dade College of Miami, Fla., 9-6. Joe Arnold, the Miami-Dade pitcher, was selected as the tourney's most valuable player while Miami catcher Bob Stinson was named the player most likely to succeed in professional baseball. Steve Lohrer of Nassau was the tourney's leading hitter.

1965—Phoenix College won its third national title with a 9-6 victory over Gulf Coast College of Panama City, Fla. Tom Burgess of the Bears won three games and was named the tournament's Most Valuable Player. Tom Robson of Phoenix was meet's top hitter with 13 hits in 24 times at bat.

1964—Miami-Dade College of Miami, Fla., swamps the Mesa College Mavericks 19-5 in the final game. Mack Gendreau of the Mavs is voted most valuable player and sets tournament strikeout record with 31. Gendreau, Barry Lersch, Bob Andrews and Jerry Chick named to all-tournament team.

1963—Wilmington, N.C. wins second juco title by beating Manatee, Fla., 9-2. Ken Widman of Long Island, N. Y. is most valuable player while Phil Dickens of Mantee is voted most likely to succeed in professional baseball and signs \$50,000 bonus contract after tournament. Tex Tolman, Bucky Hakes and Mike DerManuel of Mesa on all-tourney team.

1962—Phoenix College claims second national title by upsetting defending champion Wilmington, N. C., 13-5. Lee McFarland, Phoenix pitcher is named most valuable player while 17-year-old George Jones of Trinidad College sets tournament batting record with sensational .647 average.

1961—Wilmington, N. C., wins first tournament title by whipping Mesa College in finals and semi-final, 8-3 and 16-9 respectively. Randy Dow, Warner Brooks and Pete Lovrich of Mesa named to all-tournament team. Ron Durham of Wilmington named Most Valuable Player.

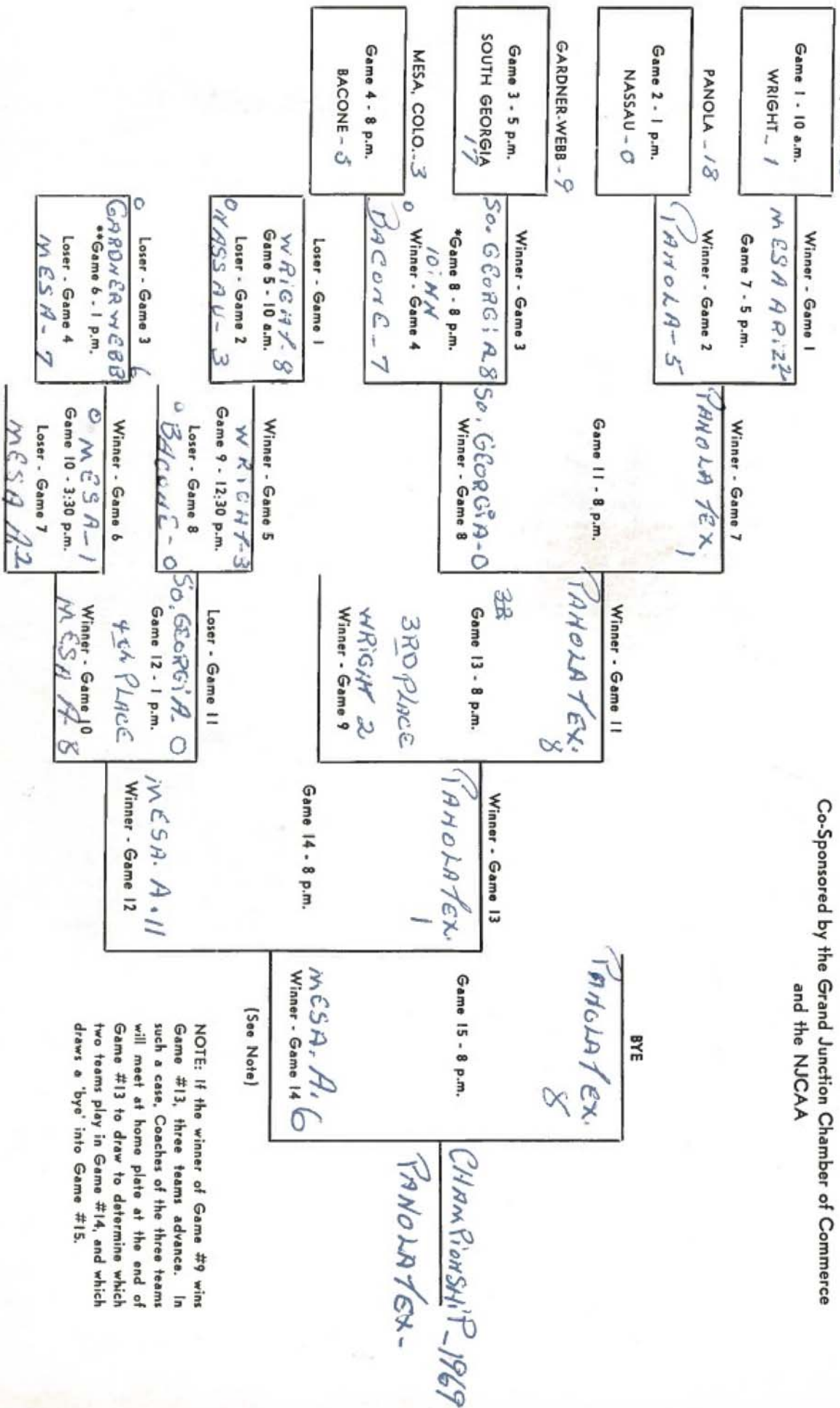
